The debut edition of the CUET-UG was conducted in July last year and was marred by glitches, prompting the NTA to cancel the exam at multiple centres. While several students were informed about the cancellation a night before the exam, many of them were turned away from centres. The UGC chairman had then said the exam at certain centres had been cancelled following reports of "sabotage". "NTA has taken all measures to test the readiness of all centres regarding computers, network infrastructure, and security. SoPs are given to observers and invigilators for all centres. Dummy tests have been conducted to check for any possible issues. "Extra computers have been arranged at each centre. Tirupati Balaji Temple in Jammu nears completion, set to open on June 8

and we started the construction work the same year. We are nearing its completion," he said. "We have been dedicatedly working on the construction of the Tirupati Balaji Temple for the last two years. The temple is constructed entirely with stones while the idols are made of cement." Rabbani, the works incharge from Andhra Pradesh, said. Sachin Narayan, a member of the works team from Andhra Pradesh, expressed, "I am involved in the construction of the Balaji Temple here. It will be completed within a month. The temple is beautiful and is being constructed by the TTD. It is indeed a remarkable temple." While the majority of the civil works, including the temple's structure, have been finished, the final phase involves the installation of some remaining portion of tiles and finishing touches to the interiors. It is estimated that it will take an additional two to three months to complete the entire complex, including the necessary infrastructure. Narayan further explained, "the entire temple is being constructed using stones, and the domes are made of cement. This is why it took some time. The entire complex will be completed in two to three months." The temple primarily utilises granite cut slabs for the temple, walls and flooring, which are sourced from Kotappa Konda in

Andhra Pradesh. Over a hundred skilled workers from Andhra Pradesh are tirelessly working to meet the deadline and ensure the temple's completion before the inauguration. The aim is to inaugurate the Jammu temple ahead of the annual Amarnath Yatra, which starts on July 1. Bhod Raj, a local worker, affirmed, "The temple will be completed before the Amarnath Yatra. We are committed to finishing it." Ajay Kumar, a stone finisher from Andhra Pradesh, said, "We are currently working on the construction of the Tirupati Balaji Temple. We are focused on the stone slabs for the flooring. The rest of the work has been completed, and we are now working on the final floor. The large stone slabs are being brought from Andhra Pradesh, cut into slabs, and used for the construction." Bhod Raj, a crane operator, said, "My role is to lift the large blocks of stones, get them cut into slabs, and transport them to the temple premises for use. I have played a significant part in the temple's construction by ferrying these massive stone slabs."

"We have all the facilities in the Jammu temple. Soon we will have a Vedic school here. Pilgrims visiting Mata Vaishno Devi temple can also visit the Tirupati Balaji Temple," TTD Chairman Reddy said. (PTI)

Stringent security measures for G20 meet in Srinagar

Authorities are taking no chances and have beefed up security across the Valley in view of the G20 meeting. Elite NSG and Marine Commandos are helping the police and the paramilitary forces to secure the venues of the event. They have been conducting security drills with the elite groups of Jammu and Kashmir Police and Central Reserve Police Force for last one week. They said massive sanitisation and area domination exercises have been carried out in the areas around the venues, along the route and in vulnerable spots of the city. Security forces have been deployed in large numbers to ensure an incident-free event. Scanners and sniffer dogs have been pressed into action to check for any explosives or IEDs. Vehicles passing through the city are being randomly checked to ensure that no subversive elements manage entry into the city. All the schools in Srinagar have been closed for next 3 days as a precautionary security measure. The administration is pulling out all stops to put on a grand show.

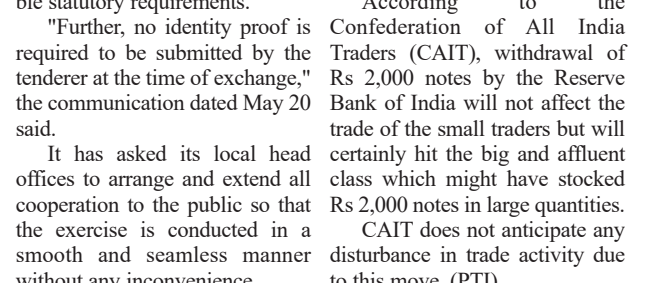
No ID proof required for exchanging notes

deposit such notes in accounts or exchange them at banks. Unlike the November 2016 shock of demonetisation, when old Rs 500 and Rs 1,000 notes were invalidated overnight, the Rs 2,000 notes will continue to be a legal tender. In a communication to Chief General Manager of all its local head offices, State Bank of India (SBI) informed that the facility of exchange of Rs 2,000 notes by public up to a limit of Rs 20,000 at a time will be allowed without obtaining any requisition slip. With regard to deposit of such notes in own account, RBI has not specified any limit but it will be subject to compliance with extant Know Your Customer (KYC) norms and other applicable statutory requirements. "Further, no identity proof is required to be submitted by the tenderer at the time of exchange," the communication dated May 20 said. It has asked its local head offices to arrange and extend all cooperation to the public so that the exercise is conducted in a smooth and seamless manner without any inconvenience. According to sources, one can stand any number of times in queue for exchange of Rs 2,000 notes. Although the facility for exchange is available from May 23, many customers were seen visiting their branches with the Rs 2,000 notes on Saturday. Bank officials returned such customers after advising them about the start date for exchange. Some of the customers used cash deposit machines on Saturday to deposit Rs 2,000 notes in their accounts. Many have tried jewellery shops to buy gold and other precious metals. However, jewellers are also hesitant in accepting Rs 2,000 notes and asking for KYC beyond prescribed cash purchase in many parts of the country. According to the Confederation of All India Traders (CAIT), withdrawal of Rs 2,000 notes by the Reserve Bank of India will not affect the trade of the small traders but will certainly hit the big and affluent class which might have stocked Rs 2,000 notes in large quantities. CAIT does not anticipate any disturbance in trade activity due to this move. (PTI)

G20 meeting to give big push to tourism in J&K: Shringla

In response to a question about some member countries not registering for the Working Group meeting, Shringla said that the G20 Tourism Working Group meeting here has the highest delegate participation and will be the most significant event held in Jammu and Kashmir. "We have the highest representation of foreign delegates in this Working Group meeting than the earlier two meetings. All I can say is we are very very happy with the turnout. We have the making of a unique meeting," Shringla said. He said the Working Group meeting has the broader objectives to present India's rich and diverse cultural identity and promote the country's tourism potential to the world. "The very idea is to use this meeting to bring attention to Jammu and Kashmir and how it can help revive handicrafts, etc. It is an opportunity to present our rich culture and heritage. No other working group does it better than the Tourism Group," he said. "This will be the most significant event in Jammu and Kashmir," Shringla added. India is halfway through its G20 presidency and 118 meetings have been held in various parts of the country so far, the G20 chief coordinator said. "We have hosted 118 meetings from the Rann of Kutch to Kohima and now from Kanyakumari and now to Kashmir. There has been a sense of attachment everywhere and I have no doubt it is the same in Srinagar," he said. Asked about the negative advisories issued by certain western countries about travel to Kashmir, Shringla said these mean nothing when foreign tourists are visiting the Valley despite such advice. "Last year, 1.88 crore tourists came to Jammu and Kashmir and a very large number of them were foreign tourists. Foreigners will come in and come in large numbers. At the end of the day, what do advisories mean? They mean nothing," he said. Shringla said the vision of Prime Minister Narendra Modi is to ensure that the message of India's G20 presidency is taken down to the grassroots level through the 'Jan Bhagadati' process and a lot of efforts have been made

to sensitise the people of the country about the G20. Giving details of the event, Tourism Secretary Arvind Singh said the stage is set for discussions and deliberations on final deliverables. "There are two key deliverables of the Tourism Working Group, which include the GOA Roadmap for Tourism as a vehicle for achieving sustainable development goals (SDGs) and the G20 Tourism Ministers' Declaration," Singh said. The third Tourism Working Group meeting will deliberate on the five key priority areas -- green tourism, digitalization, skills, MSMEs and destination management. These priorities are key building blocks for accelerating the transition of the tourism sector and achieving the targets for 2030 SDGs," he said. "A side event on 'Film Tourism for Economic Growth and Cultural Preservation' will be organised on May 22-23, focusing on strategies to promote film tourism in the Union Territory. The event will witness the participation of G20 member countries, invited countries, international organisations and industry stakeholders," Singh added. He further said a draft 'National Strategy on Film Tourism' will be unveiled to provide a roadmap for harnessing the role of films in promoting tourist destinations. Speaking on the occasion, Chief Secretary Arun Kumar Mehta said that over the past few years, J&K's tourism influx has seen an upward trend. "In 2022, 1.88 crore tourists visited J&K. I believe this is just the beginning. We will be having a direct train from Delhi to Srinagar next year and that will be a technological wonder. Foreign tourist arrivals have increased manifold this year," he said, adding that "we have kept 300 new tourist destinations ready to be explored. Sonamarg is going to be open throughout the year. J&K is offering four colours-White which means snow, rainbow meaning spring, green in summers and orange in autumn. So J&K is purely a tourism destination ready to receive guests throughout the year," he said and welcomed the foreign and domestic guests taking part in the grand event commencing tomorrow.
